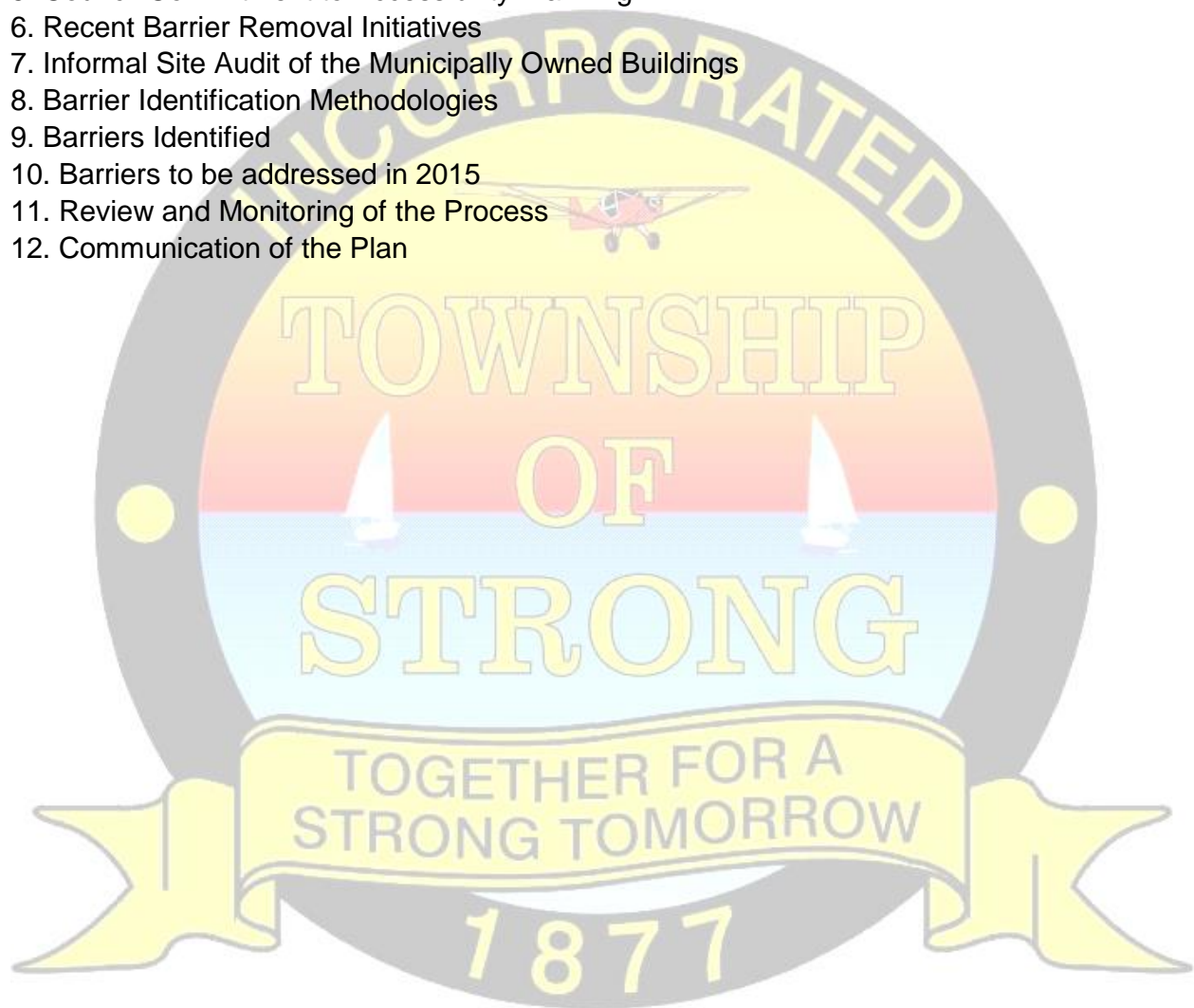

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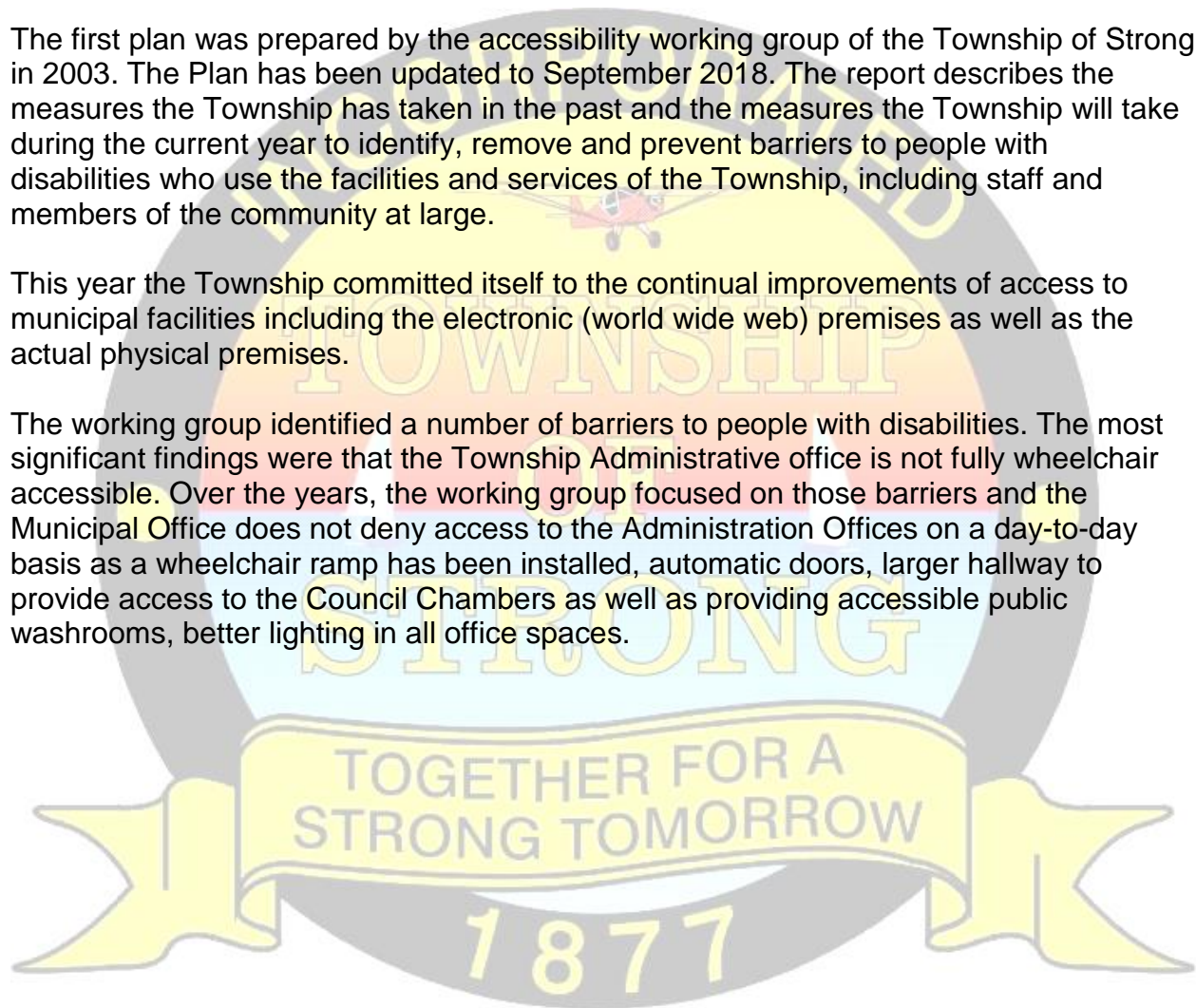
Executive Summary

The Purpose of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2001 (AODA) is to improve opportunities for people with Disabilities and to provide for their involvement in the identification, removal and prevention of barriers to their full participation in the life of the Province. To this end, the AODA mandates that each municipality prepare an annual accessibility plan.

The first plan was prepared by the accessibility working group of the Township of Strong in 2003. The Plan has been updated to September 2018. The report describes the measures the Township has taken in the past and the measures the Township will take during the current year to identify, remove and prevent barriers to people with disabilities who use the facilities and services of the Township, including staff and members of the community at large.

This year the Township committed itself to the continual improvements of access to municipal facilities including the electronic (world wide web) premises as well as the actual physical premises.

The working group identified a number of barriers to people with disabilities. The most significant findings were that the Township Administrative office is not fully wheelchair accessible. Over the years, the working group focused on those barriers and the Municipal Office does not deny access to the Administration Offices on a day-to-day basis as a wheelchair ramp has been installed, automatic doors, larger hallway to provide access to the Council Chambers as well as providing accessible public washrooms, better lighting in all office spaces.



Aim

This report describes one measure that the Township of Strong has taken for the 2003 year and the measures that the Township will take for the 2018 year to identify, remove and prevent barriers to people with disabilities who utilize the facilities and services of the Township, including staff.

Objectives

1. Describes the process by which the Township of Strong will identify, remove and prevent barriers to people with disabilities.
2. Review earlier efforts to remove and prevent barriers to people with disabilities
3. List the facilities, policies, programs, practices and services the Township will review in the coming year to identify barriers to people with disabilities
4. Describe the measures the Board will take in the coming year to identify, remove and prevent barriers to people with disabilities
5. Describe how the Township will make this accessibility plan available to the public.

Description of the Township of Strong

Provincial Location - The Township of Strong is located north of Central Ontario on the East side of Parry Sound District and in the Central area of the Almaguin Highlands and the Blue Sky Region. The Township has an area of 15,861 ha. and surrounds Lake Bernard, the largest lake in Ontario without an island and with a flood elevation at 330.5 m. There are 14 concessions in Strong and 32 Township original lots of survey.

Local Location - The Township of Strong has Hwy #11 and Hwy #124 intersecting in the centre of the Township. There is the CN Railway line running south to north through the centre of the Township and also to the North east of the Township there is the Almaguin Highlands Airpark located in Joly Township to the East of Strong Township and also located east of Strong is the Unorganized Township of Laurier. To the North of Strong is the Unorganized Township of Lount, Machar Township and the Village of South River and located within the boundaries of Strong Township is the Village of Sundridge. South of the Township of Strong is the Township of Armour and within Armour is the Village of Burk's Falls. To the West of the Township of Strong is the Municipality of Magnetawan and the Township of Ryerson.

Population/Households - The Township of Strong has a population of 1439 and 922 households (2016 census).

Public Assembly Buildings within the Township of Strong

The High School, Almaguin Highlands Secondary School, is located within the Township.

There are 3 churches within the boundaries of the Township.

The Masonic Lodge is located within the Township.

The De Novo Treatment Centre is located within the Township

The Township Municipal Office and Public Works Garage are located on adjoining properties.

Council commitment to accessibility planning

The council of the Corporation of the Township of Strong is committed to:

- The continual improvements of access to all municipally owned facilities, premises and services for all those with disabilities;
- The provision of quality services to all members of the community with disabilities;
- The provision of training for administration staff so they can adhere to applicable legislation requirements.

The Council has authorized the Clerk to prepare an accessibility plan that will enable the Council to meet these commitments.

Recent barrier – removal initiatives

Council have been made aware of the Accessible Web Content Guidelines and are in support of creating a new accessible municipal website. Staff will be trained on how to manage documents being uploaded to the web to ensure that these documents are accessible to all, or could be provided to the public in an accessible format upon request. The Township of Strong recently upgraded their website (www.strongtownship.com) and it now meets the Accessibility requirements. The Municipal Website carries the Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2001, Township of Strong's Accessibility Plan, Customer Service/IASR policy, Emergency Plan, and "How to bring a Concern" documents are available.

In 2010 the municipal office completed a major expansion to the facility and included a wheel chair ramp to the front office door, automatic doors in both entrances, accessible public washrooms, accessible hallway to council chambers. Council is discussing paving the administration office parking lot to ease access to the building.

Informal Site Audit of the Municipally owned buildings

In July 2003 the staff and council completed a survey of the municipally owned building and in particular to assess any barriers that may exist and with that, any solutions to removing those barriers in order to comply with the current legislation under the Ontarians With Disabilities Act, 2001.

There have been some barriers identified in the Municipal Administration Office and parking lot. Those will be discussed further in this document under Barriers identified.

Barriers Identification Methodologies

In Order to identify barriers the following methodology was used:

Methodology Description Status

A survey was given to all The Survey has been completed by members of council, staff by the Office staff, Council and the Chief Building Chief Building Official. The Public Works Department could not identify any Barriers.

Barriers Identified

Those who completed the survey identified the barriers listed below. Over the next year, council will have to decide which barriers should be addressed, keeping in mind budget restraints and feasibility.

Front Walkway slopes to the door	Architectural	Removed and levelled
Front Door has no automatic opener	Architectural	2004 – installed automatic door openers

No Handicapped Parking Spots	Architectural	Designated area for handicapped parking close to entry doors
Washrooms are not accessible	Physical	Installed new accessible washrooms

Communications to residents	Communications	Part of the web is text only for those who use reader devices

Barriers to be addressed in 2018

A barrier that will be addressed in 2018 will be paving the parking lot to make it easier for those in wheelchairs to use. The Council for the Township of Strong released a request for proposal for the municipal website in late 2013 or early 2014 in order to create an accessible website, as per the Accessible Website Content Guidelines level 2.0. This ensures compliance to the AODA for the public sector. This new website has now been completed and meets requirements. Council will ensure that training for all staff will be completed which includes a refresher on accessible customer service and the requirements of the Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation (IASR). An IASR Policy has been drafted and was passed in conjunction with the accessibility plan. Council have also identified that the Emergency Operation Shelter located in the basement of the administration offices is not accessible for those with disabilities. Council will look into installing a ramp from the main parking lot to enable those with disabilities access to this area of the administration offices.

Review and monitoring of the process

Council is committed to following through with this plan. This plan will be updated annually thus allowing council, staff and the public to monitor the barriers identified and the direction to which the Township is moving to remove all barriers under the Accessibility for Ontarians With Disabilities Act, 2001.

Communication of the Plan

This Plan will be available on the web site as well as at the office and we will make every attempt to make it available to those with disabilities for their perusal and review. Should a copy in Braille be requested, Council will try to accommodate by having staff contact the CNIB to inquire if it could be translated.
