Purpose of Engagement Process

- Collect initial questions, concerns, and feedback on potential impacts.
- Facilitate deeper discussions to explore community values and perspectives.
- Inform Council decisions through engagement results.

Engagement Process

Phase 1:

Collect initial opinions on amalgamation and identify questions residents have about amalgamation.

Activities: Community Conversation and Survey

Phase 2:

Respond to community questions and explore further community perspectives on amalgamation.

Activities: Community Conversation and Survey

Report Back:

Summary of feedback provided to Councils.

Who We Heard From


180 people attended the in-person community event 282 people completed the survey




What We Heard




What are your initial thoughts on amalgamation? (n=276)




What concerns or reservations do you have about amalgamation? (n=255)




What benefits do you foresee with amalgamation? (n=169)




Do you feel amalgamation will have an impact on community identity? (n=267)

Within other concerns, most respondents expressed general dissatisfaction with the process. (n=145)



Strong Concerns and Opposition

- A significant portion of residents are opposed to amalgamation.
- Concerns center on potential tax increases, with many residents fearing that amalgamation will result in higher municipal costs without improvements to services.
- Many participants question whether amalgamation will lead to job losses, reduced services, or diminished representation at the municipal level.
- Loss of local identity and governance is a recurring concern, with residents fearing that a larger municipality will dilute their community's unique character.

Demand for Clear and Transparent Information

- Residents are seeking detailed, data-driven justifications for amalgamation, particularly regarding financial impacts, service delivery, and governance structures.
- There is a desire for examples of successful and unsuccessful amalgamations, with an interest in case studies or examples from similar rural municipalities.
- Many expressed dissatisfaction with the consultation process, feeling that questions were not being answered adequately or that engagement lacked open discussion opportunities.

Potential Benefits Acknowledged by Some

- A smaller number of residents believe that amalgamation could streamline services, improve efficiency, and lead to cost savings over time.
- Some view amalgamation as an opportunity to strengthen the municipalities' ability to attract funding, infrastructure projects, and business investment.
- A few participants pointed out that a unified municipality could help resolve longstanding service-sharing disputes and improve intermunicipal cooperation.

Service and Infrastructure Considerations

- Residents are concerned about how services such as road maintenance, emergency response, and waste management will be distributed fairly across the newly amalgamated municipality.
- There is uncertainty about the future of municipal buildings, such as town offices, garages, and fire halls, with questions about potential consolidation or sale of assets.
- Participants raised concerns about whether existing infrastructure, particularly water and sewage systems in Sundridge, can support growth under an amalgamated model.

Financial and Governance Implications

- Many respondents worry about the financial implications of amalgamation, including how debts and assets from each municipality will be managed.
- There is strong resistance to the reduction in council representation, with concerns that fewer elected officials will lead to weaker local advocacy and decision-making.
- Some residents question whether government grants for municipalities will be reduced once three municipalities merge into one.

Community Identity and Engagement

- Concerns were raised about the potential loss of small-town identity, especially among Strong and Joly residents.
- Some feel that their municipality will lose its voice within a larger governance structure.
- Many residents emphasized the need for continued engagement and transparent decision-making before any decisions are made.

Rationale & Potential Benefits of Amalgamation

- 1. Why is amalgamation being considered in the first place?
- 2. What are the expected benefits of amalgamation for each of the three municipalities?
- 3. Will amalgamation lead to lower costs for residents? If so, how?
- 4. Will there be better access to (senior level) government funding and grants as an amalgamated municipality?
- 5. How will businesses, job opportunities, and economic growth be impacted by amalgamation?
- 6. Are there specific examples of successful amalgamations in Ontario that we can learn from?

Financial & Tax Implications

- 7. Will amalgamation increase my property taxes? If so, by how much?
- 8. How will municipal debt and assets be distributed among the three municipalities?
- 9. Will there be any cost savings from amalgamation? If so, where will these savings come from?
- 10. What has been spent on the amalgamation study so far, and how much will the process cost moving forward?
- 11. Will there be financial assistance from the provincial or federal government to support amalgamation?

Governance & Representation

- 12. How will council representation be structured in an amalgamated municipality?
- 13. Will residents have a vote or say in whether amalgamation happens?
- 14. What role does the province play in approving or rejecting amalgamation?
- 15. How will decision-making be balanced to ensure all three municipalities have fair representation?
- 16. Will existing municipal offices and services be consolidated? If so, what changes can we expect?

Service Delivery & Infrastructure

- 17. How will road maintenance, waste collection, and emergency services be impacted by amalgamation?
- 18. Will fire services, policing, and ambulance response times change under an amalgamated model?
- 19. Will water, sewer, and other utility costs be affected by amalgamation?
- 20. Will existing municipal staff lose their jobs as a result of amalgamation?
- 21. Will services improve, decline, or stay the same?

Community Identity & Quality of Life

- 22. Will Strong and Joly lose their individual identities, or will new names be introduced?
- 23. How will amalgamation impact rural areas differently than the Village of Sundridge?
- 24. Will there be changes to local zoning and development regulations?
- 25. Will amalgamation attract more businesses or investment to the region?
- 26. How will this affect seasonal property owners?

Next Steps & Decision-Making

- 27. What are the next steps in the amalgamation process, and when will a final decision be made?
- 28. Will there be more opportunities for public consultation before a decision is made?
- 29. What happens if the community overwhelmingly opposes amalgamation?
- 30. Are there alternatives to full amalgamation, such as increased shared services?
- 31. If amalgamation is approved, how long will it take to implement?
